As comfortable playing Haydn, Mozart and Beethoven in recital halls as it is being the foundation of multi-media collaborations and commissioning new works, the Quartet brings passion, honesty, and energy to every performance.

Since 1996, Cecily Ward, Tom Stone, Ethan Filner and Jennifer Kloetzel have worked tirelessly to create and hone the unique and refreshingly open sound that is the hallmark of this Quartet. Of the Cypress Quartet's Beethoven Late Quartets, Vol. 1 album, Gramophone wrote, "What wondrous artistry to behold." Fanfare raved: "The technical resources of this ensemble are awesome" and The Denver Post named the recording one of the Top 10 Classical Releases of 2009.

Critics have likewise praised the Quartet's uncompromising performances of contemporary music: in its review of the Cypress' Benjamin Lees Quartets 1, 5 and 6 CD (2009, Naxos), Strings Magazine observed "Brilliant individual and ensemble technique. They handle the music's sound effects, changing tempi and dynamics, rugged rhythm and singing lines with ease and authority."

On top of a busy schedule of over 90 concerts each year at prominent national and international venues including the Kennedy Center, Library of Congress, Stanford Lively Arts, Cal Performances, Krannert Center and the Ravinia Festival, the Cypress String Quartet is a vibrant member of the San Francisco arts community, dedicated to reflecting and enriching the city's cultural landscape.



**Elena Ruehr** grew up in Michigan's isolated and beautiful Upper Peninsula. Her musical training began at home where she learned folk songs from her mother, who sang and played guitar. Her father, a mathematician, played jazz piano and listened to the Beethoven and Bartok string quartets while solving equations. Her older brothers brought home recordings of Morton Sobotnik and Led Zeppelin, Janis Joplin and Paul Simon. Elena started playing the piano and composing at age four. With her mother as teacher, she quickly learned to read music and to improvise. She also studied ballet and modern dance for nine years, and later learned various forms of folk dance. As a teenager, Ruehr worked as a church organist, rock-band keyboardist/singer and musical director of the local university's theater troupe. Her town of 4,000 was also home to Finnish kantele player and classically trained composer Melvin Kangas, who became Ruehr's mentor during high school and passed on to her his dedication to beauty, individualism, and the avant-garde. In addition to her classical training with William Bolcom at the University of Michigan and Vincent Persichetti at The Juilliard School, Dr. Ruehr played in the University of Michigan Gamelan and studied West African drumming.

A faculty member at M.I.T. since 1991, Elena's music has been described as "a score of vivid aural colors," "complex, full-blown and florid," and as having "a naturalness and beauty that's both purposeful and immediately appealing."
